

Congrats to Dr. Abbey, Tanner, and big brother Trip Schwab on welcoming their baby Tegan.



- Bacterial Infections:
 Leptospirosis, Feline
 Infectious Peritonitis
- 2. Toxin: Lilies, Raisins, Rat Bait,

- 3. Trauma

New Equipment:

Shiloh is a 4 year old dog who walked through our doors in Keystone for the first time in June of 2023 with a wagging tail and a long history of eye issues. Dr. Paula

was able to quickly diagnose him with glaucoma using our handheld tonometer. With the Tonovet our doctors are able to check intraocular pressures in real time without referral to a specialist. Glaucoma occurs when fluid cannot drain properly from the eye resulting in damage to the optic nerve and blindness. The damage to Shiloh's right eye was far too extensive and Dr. Paula performed an enucleation surgery removing the eye that had been causing him pain and discomfort. The good news is that with daily eye drops given by his family Shiloh has gone on to manage his glaucoma and keep the vision in his left eye.
